

THE POWER OF PARTNERSHIP

2008 was a year defined by what can be accomplished by working together. Here are a few examples of partnerships which resulted in transformative purchases of state-of-the-art equipment and technology in critical patient care areas.

The Foundation was honored to partner with the members of Soroptimist International of Oak Harbor in a campaign to bring digital mammography services to the women of North Whidbey by purchasing equipment for the Hospital's Oak Harbor clinic facility. Our shared commitment to save lives through the early detection of breast cancer was kicked off by Soroptimist life member Bev Elvebak and capped by the Foundation's legacy donors Robert and June Sebo. Ultimately, over 200 individuals, businesses, church groups, service organizations and clubs contributed to the campaign which raised \$259,205 for the full cost of the equipment.

Another example of the power of partnership was the purchase of vital sign monitors for every bed in the inpatient medical-surgical unit. Combining unrestricted contributions to the Foundation with hospital district tax levy dollars, six mobile units were replaced with 32 dedicated monitors with the capacity to automatically download patient information to patients' digital medical records. This \$120,000 project will reduce infection transmission, increase patient safety and reduce labor costs related to the continual need to disinfect the mobile units as they were moved from patient to patient.

The Foundation has an ongoing grantwriting program to pursue funding partnerships with private foundations, community organizations and state/federal sources. In 2008, the Foundation supplemented many grant awards from these funders to initiate innovative programs and purchase new technology which resulted in systemic improvements to hospital services.

One of our successes was the partnership of the local philanthropic organization Island Thrift, the global health services corporation Cardinal Health and our Foundation, which provided \$25,000 to initiate a pioneering infection control program. Building on existing practices and procedures, the program uses a scientifically grounded national model to target hospital-acquired infections in patient care areas and family/visitor entry points.

Another successful collaboration benefited the Whidbey Family Birthplace obstetrics unit. The unit had three radiant warmers to keep newborn babies warm and to regulate babies' temperatures when they were ill. Two

of the warmers were over 15 years old. Grants from three regional philanthropic entities, The Moyer Foundation, the D.V. and Ida J. McEachern Trust and Ronald McDonald House Charities, were combined with Foundation funds to replace these warmers with integrated units with built-in oxygen and suction capabilities. The new incubators are fully functional when they are unplugged or in motion which allows them to be used as a 'code cart' in the ER for critical situations.


